Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

It has come to my attention that I can be loud. Maybe this is no surprise to you. Yes, I was told recently that I can be loud when I preach, even too loud. Why in fact, even my wife chimed in saying, "I think you were a little loud in the last sermon."

Hmmmm....whatever shall I do!?!

Well, one Sunday recently I tried turning off the pulpit mic and just using the lapel mic. But the live streamers were not happy. Then I tried using the pulpit and lapel mic but speaking softly...but I wasn't happy...alas! I've been thinking the best thing to do is to turn off the sound system altogether and just project from the belly, like they did in the good ol' days...ironically, then I saw the title Bob selected for the newsletter:

Sing...Loud and Clear

Loud and Clear? This phrase is drawn from our hymn of the season where we read, "Sing choirs of angels **loud and clear**, repeat their song of glory here, Christ has triumphed..." In the joy of Easter, how does this hymn tell us to sing? **LOUD** and **CLEAR**. Why? Because **CHRIST HAS TRIUMPHED!** Our joy at the announcement of the resurrection causes us to be full voiced when it comes to the message of Jesus' victory over sin, death and the power of the devil on our behalf.

At our Easter and Confirmation services this year I noticed something quite profound. I'm not the only loud one! Now, I was feeling a little bummed about being called loud, but then I listened to Pastor Frank play the organ, three trumpets blast away and a full sanctuary of Christians singing loudly and clearly saying, "Christ has triumphed, Christ has triumphed, Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!" In fact, this joy filled singing was so loud I don't think people heard me give the blessing at communion! The sanctuary was full of music. It was loud and clear. It was obvious, something very important was taking place. The message of Jesus' resurrection was bouncing off the walls and within our hearts...and it was a beautiful, if not, deafening thing.

The "loud and clear" message of Christ's resurrection is the foundation of our faith. You can read more about this on our Hymn of the Season page where Pastor Frank writes about Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 15. The idea of "loud and clear" relates to confession and witness. We read in the Bible that God's people, living out their faith, are called to witness boldly that Jesus Christ is Lord and confess His name before the world. Paul says as much in Romans 10:9-10 saying:

"...if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes and is justified, and with the mouth one confesses and is saved."

The image at the right is the sketch that became the formal image for the hymn, "Holy God We Praise Thy Name" in Hymns of the Season vol. 5 I love the sketches. Notice the mouths of the children. Pastor Frank and I discussed how the mouths should be open wide because this is what the Gospel does to us. It calls forth a loud and clear and joyous response with our lips and our lives. We like to think that the work of our churches and Sunday Schools, and Day Schools and Parish Based Music Conservatories are helping children and adults open their mouths wide to sing and speak loudly and clearly the Gospel message of Jesus Christ crucified and risen for the life of the world!



Now, I must admit. There is a difference between being full voiced and being a loud mouth!!!! I will listen to my wife's recommendations and try to preach to my beloved family in Christ in a way that doesn't hurt your ears...

...But I will admit, I don't know if that will be possible...

Preserving the Church's Song Organ Project Update

On Saturday evening, April 19, 2025, St. Paul's began using the refurbished organ for regular worship services. A dedication blessing and prayer was held before each Divine service on Sunday morning, April 20, 2025. Pastor Frank began the service with a prelude on the piano, then opened the voice of the organ, with an introduction into "Jesus Christ is ris'n today, Alleluia!" (LSB) 457. What a wonderful Easter Vigil & Easter Morning hearing the organ play. As noted in the April newsletter, this is only 85 percent of the organ's full utilization. The original organ parts that were kept and refurbished, along with several new ranks were used.

Bedient Organ is continuing to work on the remaining pipes that will be installed the Great Room along with the new façade with working pipes for the two large openings in the Chancel and Transept areas. On page 3 there is a diagram showing the Great Room along with the pipes, windchest, and reservoir that still need to be installed.

There is still a static reserve air reservoir that will be above the blower that will give plenty of air for the entire system when Pastor Frank hits all the notes at the same time.

Staff, from Bedient, provided a brief update on the work being done in the shop. Reading between the lines, it looks like the Bedient team might be back here at St. Paul's in late May or June to install additional pieces in the Great Room.

Pastor Frank, along with the organ students, are finding a few "quirks and ciphers" as they have been practicing and playing on the organ. Bedient has been coming up to work and resolve the issues. The recording feature on the organ console is a wonderful new learning tool as Pastor Frank spoke of a few months ago. This allows Pastor and the student to record the songs they practice and play back to hear how they played the song. It also allows Bedient to see when a "cipher" occurs while the organist is playing.

This is a good time to remind everyone of three important dates coming up in May where the organ will be used outside of the Worship Service. First on Monday, May 12, 2025, at 7:00pm the Bethany Lutheran College Mankato's Concert Choir will be here at St. Paul's to perform for their 2025 Choir Tour. Bethany, for those that do not know, is where Pastor Frank received his bachelor's degree in church music in 2007 before going to Seminary in Ft. Wayne.

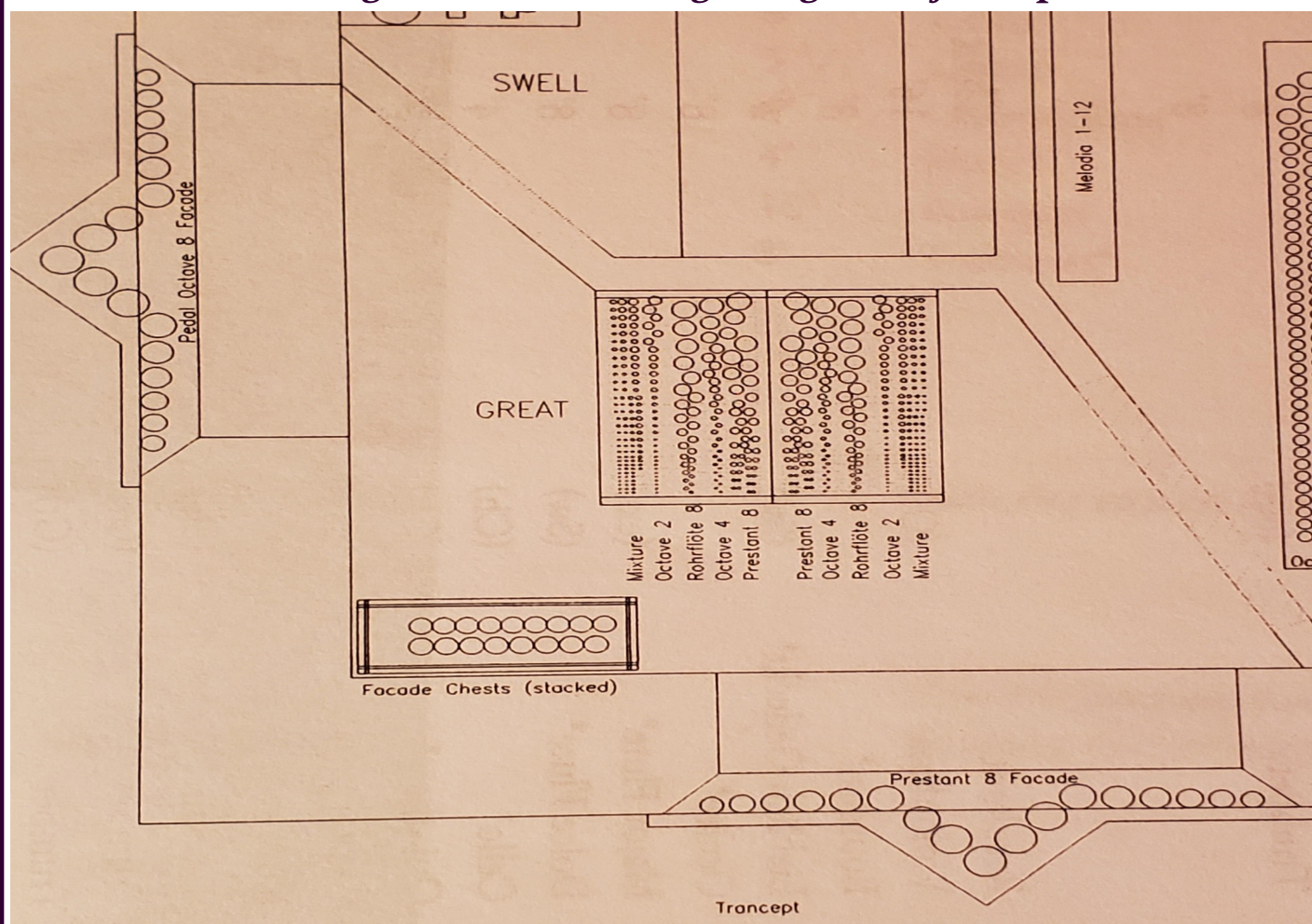

Hymn of the Season

Theme Hymn “Now All the Vault of Heaven Resound” (LSB 465)

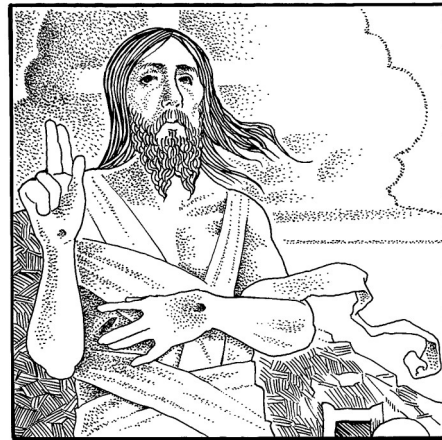
1 Now all the vault of heav’n resounds
In praise of love that still abounds:
“Christ has triumphed! He is living!”
Sing, choirs of angels, loud and clear!
Repeat their song of glory here:
“Christ has triumphed! Christ has triumphed!”
Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

2 Eternal is the gift He brings,
Therefore our heart with rapture sings:
“Christ has triumphed! He is living!”
Now still He comes to give us life
And by His presence stills all strife.
Christ has triumphed! He is living!
Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

3 O fill us, Lord, with dauntless love;
Set heart and will on things above
That we conquer through Your triumph;
Grant grace sufficient for life’s day
That by our lives we truly say:
“Christ has triumphed! He is living!”

4 Adoring praises now we bring
And with the heav’nly blessed sing:
“Christ has triumphed! Alleluia!”
Be to the Father and our Lord,
To Spirit blest, most holy God,
All the glory, never ending!
Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

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Have you ever thought about what life would be like if Jesus had not risen from the dead? If Jesus hadn’t risen, what would it mean about our faith? What would it mean about our death? What would it mean about our daily living?

St. Paul answers these questions in 1 Corinthians 15. In the opening verses, he recalls the many witnesses who saw Jesus after He rose. They saw the things that you see in our artist’s image. Do you see the scars in Jesus’ hands, reminding us that He truly died? Do you see the empty grave that could not hold Him? Do you see the graveclothes which could bind Him no longer? Why do you suppose it is important to know that Jesus truly died and that He truly was raised from the dead?

In verses 17-18, Paul says, “And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished.” If Jesus is not risen, we would have no forgiveness of sins. We would have no hope when a loved one dies and no certainty of life in heaven. Our lives now would be hopeless and sad. However, because Christ is risen, our faith has a solid foundation. Because Christ is risen, we, too, will rise! Because Christ is risen, we have a source of daily joy!

Paul concludes the chapter, “Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain” (verse 58). Because Christ is risen, we can be about the work God gives us to do in our daily callings. Our daily living reflects the hope that we have, just as we pray for in stanza 3 of our hymn.

Did you know that the word Alleluia means “Praise the Lord”? How many times is the word Alleluia used in this hymn? Discuss with your parent or teacher the ways in which our hymn proclaims both the reality of Jesus’ resurrection and its significance in our daily callings.

Music and Missions in Taiwan

St. Paul's preschoolers and Christ Academy students aren't the only ones playing colored hand bells these days! St. Paul's sponsored missionary in Taiwan, Becky Bartelt, is shown here at a hand bell workshop conducted at the end of March. Two such workshops were led. She also was instrumental in leading a "Spring Outreach Concert" in anticipation of Holy Week.

On April 12th the community was invited to a "Spring Recital" to perform mu-

sic or to listen. So many instruments and instrumentalists we present! Everything from erhus to cellos to French horns to voices to pianos to recorders to a pipa. (Erhus and pipas are Chinese string instruments.) The youngest performer was 7 years old. The oldest were new musicians participating in a program for people over 50 to learn a new instrument for free.

Becky introduced the concert with these words, *"Today we will hear Western classical music, Chinese folk music, Western modern music, and Christian sacred music. Just a little explanation in case you're wondering why some of the Christian sacred music for Spring sounds sad. We are right now in the season of Lent when Christians remember their sins, repent of them and give thanks for forgiveness in Jesus. Some pieces will reflect this time. Other pieces will reflect the joy of Easter, which comes at the end of Lent—rejoicing in Jesus' resurrection from the dead for our salvation."*

Many people in this ministry area are drawn to learning more about music. We thank God for Becky and her work in Taiwan as she intentionally brings Christ to the world through music!

Note: Becky will be back at St. Paul's for a special presentation this June 15th. On that day, our 10:45am service will be held outside using our outdoor pulpit! Who knows, maybe we'll also use colored hand bells!

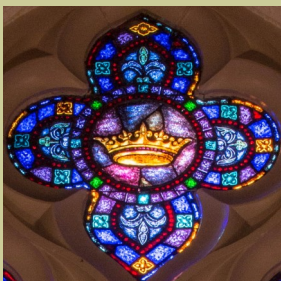

Resurrection Cookies

In this age of busy, busy, busy, this recipe is a great way to join fun family time AND hear again the account of Jesus' death and resurrection. The cookies are to be made the evening before Easter, with each step accompanied by Bible Verses to be read and discussed. The cookies are then placed in the oven which is then sealed, over night. On Easter morning, open the oven, remove the cookies and see what is (or isn't) inside them



Ingredients for the Cookies

- 1 cup whole pecans
- 1 teaspoon vinegar
- 3 egg whites
- 1 pinch salt
- 1 cup sugar

Supplies

- 1 zip top plastic bag
- 1 wooden spoon
- scotch tape

Bible

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 300F (don't skip this step).
2. Place pecans in zip top bag and let kids beat them with the wooden spoon to break into small pieces. Explain that after Jesus was arrested, He was beaten by the Roman soldiers. **Read: John 19:1-3**
3. Let each child smell the vinegar, then put 1 teaspoon vinegar into a mixing bowl. Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross He was given vinegar to drink. **Read: John 19:28-30**
4. Add egg whites to vinegar. Eggs represent life. Explain that Jesus gave His life to give us life. **Read: John 10:10-11**
5. Sprinkle a little salt into each child's hand. Let them taste it, then put the rest into the mixing bowl. Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers and the bitterness of our own sin. **Read: Luke 23:27**
6. Add 1 cup sugar. Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him. **Read: Psalm 34:8 and John 3:16**
7. Beat on high speed for 12 to 15 minutes until stiff peaks are formed. Explain that the color white represents the purity in God's eyes of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. **Read: Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3**
8. Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoon onto a cookie sheet covered with waxed paper. Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid. **Read: Matthew 27:57-60**
9. Put the cookie sheet in the oven, close the door, and **turn the oven OFF**. Give each child a piece of tape and seal the oven door. Explain that Jesus' tomb was sealed. **Read: Matthew 27:65-66**
10. **GO TO BED!** Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight. Jesus' followers were in despair when the tomb was sealed. **Read: John 16:20&22**
